Asians & Pacific Islanders and HIV/AIDS in Alameda County

FACTS TO KNOW

Asians and Pacific Islanders (A&PI) make up 27% of the total population of Alameda County, making them the 2nd largest, and fastest growing, racial/ethnic group in the county.

Alameda County ranks $\mathbf{4}^{th}$ among California's 58 counties in total AIDS diagnosis and $\mathbf{7}^{th}$ in HIV cases.

Between 1980 and 2010, 75 HIV and 278 AIDS cases have been diagnosed among A&PI.

Among A&PI, 83% of HIV/AIDS cases, diagnosed in 2010, were men.

The most common mode of transmission among A&PI men is **men-having-sex-with-men** (MSM) and the most common mode of transmission among A&PI women is **heterosexual contact**.

HIV/AIDS cases, diagnosed in 2010, are most prevalent among A&PI who are 40 to 49 years-old.

92% of HIV/AIDS cases, diagnosed in 2010 among A&PI, were immigrants born outside the US.

Of the **121** A&PI diagnosed with AIDS between 1999 and 2009, 86 (**71%**) of them are **late testers** (people who are diagnosed with AIDS **at the same time** or **within 1 year** of their initial HIV diagnosis).

A&PI were the only group to have an **increase** in HIV and AIDS cases among all racial/ethnic groups between 2006 and 2010. (See graph below)

Percent (%) Change, from 2006 to 2010, in HIV/AIDS Cases in Alameda County



RESOURCES TO USE

Risk Factors and Barriers to Prevention

- ✓ There are cultural taboos against discussing sexual topics and power differences in relationships.
- ✓ A&PI are less likely than other races/ethnicities to test and/or reveal they have been tested for HIV.
- ✓ There are cultural and language barriers to accessing public health messages and care, aggravated by limited culturally appropriate services.
- ✓ Unprotected sexual intercourse including oral, vaginal, and anal can increase risks.
- ✓ Use of methamphetamines, alcohol and other drugs can increase risks.

What Can You Do?

- ✓ Learn about HIV/AIDS and its impacts on your communities.
- ✓ Educate others and help end the HIV/AIDS related stigma by talking openly and honestly about HIV prevention and treatment.
- ✓ Get tested in order to protect yourself and others.
- ✓ If you test positive, seek appropriate medical care and support and inform partners of potential exposures.
